POPE FRANCIS WEDNESDAY AUDIENCE ST. PETER'S SQUARE 22ND MARCH 2023 We must be aware that the people to whom evangelization is addressed are not only others, those who profess other faiths or who profess none, but also ourselves, believers in Christ and active members of the People of God. And we must convert every day, receive the word of God and change our life: every day...To bear this witness, the Church as such must also begin by evangelizing herself. If the Church does not evangelize herself, she remains a museum piece. Instead, it is by evangelizing herself that she is continually updated. She needs to listen unceasingly to what she must believe, to her reasons for hoping, to the new commandment of love. The Church, which is a People of God immersed in the world, and often tempted by idols - many of them - and she always needs to hear the proclamation of the works of God. In brief, this means that she has a constant need of being evangelized, she needs to read the Gospel, to pray and to feel the force of the Spirit changing her heart. A Church that evangelizes herself in order to evangelize is a Church that, guided by the Holy Spirit, is required to walk a demanding path, a path of conversion and renewal. This also entails the ability to change the ways of understanding and living its evangelizing presence in history, avoiding taking refuge in the protected zones of the logic of "it has always been done this way". They are the refuges that cause the Church to sicken. The Church must go forward, she must grow continually; in this way she will remain young....The Church must be a Church that dialogically encounters the contemporary world, that weaves fraternal relationships, that generates spaces of encounter, implementing good practices of hospitality, of welcome, of recognition and integration of the other and of otherness, and that cares for the common home that is creation. That is, a Churchthat encounters the Lord every day, and dialogues with the Lord, and allows the Holy Spirit, the agent of evangelization, to enter. Without the Holy Spirit we can only publicize the Church, not evangelize. It is the Spirit in us that drives us towards evangelization, and this is the true freedom of the children of God.

PARISH PASTORAL ASSEMBLY "The collaboration of all members, ordained, lay and religious, is integral to each stage of the work of the pastoral assembly. The parish pastoral assembly needs to develop ways and means of building its connection with the parish community, gathering the views and wisdom of parishioners and being a channel of communication. In the Code of Canon Law, the Assembly [Council] is described as 'consultative' to the parish priest (Can. 536). Members of Parish Pastoral Assemblies are people of faith who come together as one body to discern what the Holy Spirit is saying in the parish today. Relationships on the Parish Pastoral Assembly are characterised by a spirituality of communion that encourages fruitful dialogue 'leading to pondered agreement in matters open to discussion.' Consultation in the church is rooted in the understanding of the Church as a community of believers who share in the priestly, prophetic and governing mission of Jesus. It also reflects our belief in the universality of the gifts of the Holy Spirit. They respect the diversity of roles and functions of all members, including the hierarchic leadership of the pastor, and together as a unified body they engage in a process of consultative decision-making. The Parish Pastoral Assembly is not a legislative body for issuing decrees or statues on its own behalf or that of the parish priest, but is engaged with the priest in a common search for wisdom. While the Parish Pastoral Assembly needs to be aware of all parish activities; it is not within the scope of the Council to 'direct' parish activities. The priest consults his people because he knows that wisdom resides with them. That wisdom emerges in dialogue. It emerges in the knowledge and common sense of fair-minded people. The task of parish pastoral assembly members is to "represent" by "making present" the wisdom of the parish. By virtue of his office the Parish Priest presides over and ratifies all pastoral assembly processes, leading up to and including final options and implementations. This collegial process respects the role of the Parish Priest who, in turn, takes into account the integrity, expertise and prayerful deliberations of the members of the pastoral assembly and of the whole community. While the structures of participation are consultative rather than judicial, this does not mean that they are less meaningful and relevant." During the weeks of Lent let us reflect and pray in preparation for the forming of our Parish Pastoral Assembly in the Season of Easter.
